

WHAT'S GOING ON AT GRACE CHURCH?

Council Minutes Highlights June 2014

- Approved Building Use Requests by Tiny Tots for Fellowship Hall on Monday, August 18, 2014 from 6:30-8:00 PM; Wednesday, November 19, 2014 from 10:15 AM-2:30 PM; and Friday, December 19, 2014 from 12:30-3:30 PM.
- The treasurer reported Total Income for April of \$15,833 and Total Expenses of \$22,626, leaving a deficit of \$6,793.
- Approved Pastor's request that Joseph Hartman be accepted into membership on Sunday, June 8, 2014.
- The final payment on our \$6,000 loan from the Lutheran Church Extension Society to finance the new roof on the west wing of the sanctuary was made on June 11, 2014.
- Approved Property Committee's request to hire Cutting Edge Contracting to replace the concrete steps, and four sections of sidewalk leading to the Church Office entrance as well as refurbish the railing. The approximate cost is \$8,000 and will be

- financed with money from the Sidewalk and Railing Fund.
- Tiny Tots' contract renewal was approved on the recommendation of the Property Committee. There is no increase in their "spatial use" but they will continue to pay for 23% of the church gas bill each month, based on the "averaged" 8-month heating season.
- The Property Committee
 was given approval to go
 ahead with arrangements
 for certification training
 on use of the A.E.D. as
 well as CPR for all those
 interested

July 2014

- Approved Requests for Building Use by Tiny Tots in Fellowship Hall on Friday, October 3, 2014, and also Prevention Network for an unknown date.
- The treasurer reported Total Income for June of \$21,954 and Total Expenses of \$22,938, leaving a deficit of \$984.
- Pastor Clagg met with the owner of Juliet Apartments, on the corner of Deer Lane and New York Avenue, Rochester, to

- view a possible apartment for the intern. The rent would be \$425/month plus utilities, pro-rated for the month of August. Pastor will seek the approval of Redeemer Church before proceeding.
- A variety of No Smoking signs are being investigated for posting inside and outside the church.
- An A.E.D. and CPR training for Wednesday, September 24, 2014, at 7 PM in Fellowship Hall was approved. Mr. Jim Siget will conduct the class at a cost of \$100, subsidized by the church. Each trainee is to pay his/her own fee of \$20.
- The ELW hymnal, first setting, will be used at the 10:45 service starting September 7. Practice with the congregation will begin in August.
- Pastor will be on vacation from July 19-31, 2014. The Rev. Phil Jamison will be the supply pastor while he is on vacation; The Rev. Martin Galbraith of New Hope will be on call for emergencies.



Capital Budget projects Old Elevator Removal



Censer and Incense



A censer (or thurible) is a vessel commonly used by Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches, as well as some Protestant ones, to burn incense during worship, often on special occasions. Censers come in many sizes, shapes and designs. A worship leader may swing a chain censer to waft the fragrant incense smoke over the congregation during a procession or benediction. As incense burns in a censer and smoke wafts upward, it symbolizes prayers of the faithful, floating to God. "May my prayer be set before you like incense; may the lifting up of my hands be like the evening sacrifice" (Psalm 141:2, NIV).

- 1. Using the cardboard insert or picture from the frame as a pattern, cut the notebook paper to fit the frame. Then insert it behind the glass.
- 2. Decorate the outside of the frame by gluing on buttons, ribbon, stickers or foam shapes.
- 3. Glue one side of the Velcro to the erasable pen and one side to the frame.

 Then attach the pen to the frame.
- 4. Place the board on your desk, dresser or kitchen counter. On the glass, write daily reminders about assignments and activities.

STAMPS FOR A LIVING

For quite a few years, Grace Church has been collecting cancelled stamps which are forwarded to the Stamps for a Living project at Bethel St. Elizabeth Foundation of America, Inc., at The United Church, Washington, D.C.

So what is the Stamps for a Living project? It is a stamp reprocessing business that provides the patients of three mental health programs with an opportunity to earn a

small salary through "meaningful work," a first step to be able to get back into the everyday life outside the hospital. Each month they receive approximately one million stamps. The

programs serve patients of the Inpatient Forensic Service Bureau of St. Elizabeth's and deaf mental health consumers at Deaf-REACH in Washington, D.C.

Presently, 72 individuals, 30 in the John Howard Pavilion at St. Elizabeth's, 24 in St. Elizabeth's Inpatient Buand 18 at Deafreau. REACH, work two hours a day sorting, trimming, counting and bagging stamps for sale. Patients are paid for their work through Work Adjustment Program Funds. However, as Stamps for a Living becomes better established, it will generate funds to pay for expenses, plus salaries. In addition, common stamps such as the U.S. flag or Statue of Liberty are used to create maps of the United States, which are matted and framed to fill individual requests.

Participants in the program remove used postage stamps from paper and sort the stamps by country of origin, type of stamp, value, etc. After stamps are processed, they are repackaged for sale to collectors. Repackaged stamps are sold individually, in packets, or by volume. All this is labor-intensive work:

even more demanding is determining the worth of an individual stamp, evaluating its face value, the details of its design, its color and its perfection or imperfections.

HERE'S HOW YOU CAN

Collect cancelled HELP. stamps that you receive (greeting cards of all kinds are a good source), or that you find when going through old files. Recently, while going through old files at the church office. I found about 25 stamps from 1999 to 2002. Also, a friend gave me a lot of really old stamps cut from correspondence that was sent to her father and mother shortly after WWII. You get the idea. Just cut the away the entire envelope except for about ½ inch of paper around the stamp. If you tear the stamp, it is of no value. Stamps should be undamaged. Bring them to church and put them in the box on the table at the rear of the sanctuary or put them in an envelope, mark it for Karen Baker's attention, and leave it on the table in the Choir Room. I'll take care of the rest.

- Purchase of a new policy naming Grace Church the owner and beneficiary. In this form the premiums are tax deductible.


