

Dear Pr. Clagg:

Thank you to the congregation of Grace for the generous gift to Crossroads Shelter in the amount of \$479.50. It is only through contributions such as yours that Crossroads is able to provide shelter to the homeless men of Beaver County. As of the end of October, approximately 191 men have passed through the doors of our church building to find a safe haven for the night, as well as assistance in

locating job training, employment, permanent housing, medical care, drug and alcohol rehabilitation and other services. Approximately 25% of the men have moved on to permanent housing, and in most gainful employment, cases while another 25% or so were discharged to residential treatment facilities for drug and alcohol addiction. This is considered to be a very high "success rate" among homeless shelters....

Council Minutes Highlights

November 2014

- Approved the Building Use Request of LifeSteps Early Headstart for Thursday, December 18, 2014, from 10 AM to 1:30 PM.
- The treasurer reported Total Income for October of \$25,732 and Total Expenses of \$22,314. The year-to-date deficit is \$10,213. The proposed 2015 budget was recommended for approval by the congregation.
- Approved Pastor's request that Philip William
 Cotter be accepted for
 membership on November 16, 2014 at the 8:30
 AM service.
- "Wild Wednesdays" will alternate weekly between Grace and Redeemer with the host church responsible for dinner
- A work day is planned for Saturday, December 13, at 9 AM. The congregation is encouraged to participate.
- Approved Mission Endowment Committee's recommendation that \$200,000 be withdrawn from the "Unrestricted" funds of the Mission Endowment

- dowment Fund. It is recognized this withdrawal is not a loan and it is hoped the money can be repaid to the fund in a period of three to five years. No further withdrawals may be made from the principal of the Endowment Fund until the \$200,000 is repaid, except in a dire emergency.
- of the slate of nominees for Council vacancies beginning 2015: Ronnie Sines, Veronica Belanger, Walter Van Dyke and Janet Ramella 3 year terms; Charles Andrews 2 year term; Tesa Hill/Mikey Dierdorf 1 year term.
- Advent coin folders will be divided 50% to the Capital Budget and 50% to Pastor's Discretionary Fund
- To date, the Synod has not approved our revised Constitution.

December 2014

- Approved the Building Use Request of Cindy Spearing for use of Fellowship Hall for a birthday party on January 10, 2015
- Pastor reported a check

- settling the estate of Robert White was received.
- The treasurer reported Total Income for November of \$23,649 and Total Expenses of \$20,497. The year-to-date deficit is \$7,087.
- The front entrance and sidewalk capital project will go out for bids in mid -January. Proposed startup is late March or early April.
- Tiny Tots did not receive the Lowe's grant to replace flooring in their area.
- Approved the request of the Mission Endowment Committee that \$70,000 of the approved \$200,000 Unrestricted Funds withdrawal be used to pay off the loan from BNY Mellon.
- Congregational meeting will be held on January 25, 2015 between services. A light breakfast will be served by Council.
- To date, the Synod has not approved our revised Constitution.





Answer: "And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Micah 6:8, NIV $\,$


Lenten living

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 18 this year. Christians have observed this season of the church year since the fourth century. It's traditionally a time of reflection, penitence and spiritual renewal before Easter.

During Lent, some Christians give up something that hinders their relationship with God. Others do something extra for their spiritual growth or make a special sacrifice. The key is to make Lent a memorable season of sincere spiritual growth — a time that can set the tone for the rest of the year.

These events, however, while being amazing at the time, are a type of 'mountain-top' experience - that being, we are on top of the world and nothing - nothing else can top it. The trick, the challenge we are faced with after achieving this mountain-top experience is maintaining the high we get from these experiences - and this can be difficult.

How can we keep the warm-fuzzies from these events and how can we spread this feeling to others? In the coming weeks eight youth from both the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer and Grace Lutheran will be venturing to Pittsburg to participate in the Youth Quake event where they will explore their faith in a safe and faith-filled environment with a diverse assortment of youth from the area.

They will sing, dance, engage in fellowship, yet these things are only a small part of one's growth in the church or otherwise. The real growth comes when congregations nurture and expand upon the experiences of these types of events.

Our youth are coming into their own and church is arguably the one place where children and youth are allowed to be as such. My challenge, my call for those reading is simple: take a youth under your wing as Christ did. Let's make church the mountaintop experience that never ends, for our youth and our adults too!

An Endowment Moment...

The following is a look at a former Grace member, Agnes Doyle, who provided generously for the church through a bequest to the endowment fund. Agnes Doyle understood the value of an endowment fund and the importance of the congregation's long-term financial viability.

Agnes Doyle's legacy.

Agnes came to us from St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Rochester when her church merged with Grace Church on December 2, 1990. On that day, at Agnes' initiative, members of St. Paul's Church processed up Adams Street to Grace Church carrying a banner and the St. Paul's artifacts. With this merger, Grace Church gained some very members. faithful From those thirteen or so members, David and Janet Boyers, Chris Gomory and Bill Bostic continue to be active in our church.

St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church was started with a merger of two German speaking congregations: one a Lutheran Church from Bridgewater and the other a Reformed Church from Rochester. The year was 1867. On September 13, 1868 the cornerstone, for their church, was laid by the Reverend William A. Passavant. the founder of Grace Church in 1854.

After the merger, the stained glass window that adorned the back of St. Paul's chancel was moved to our sanctuary and placed on the south wall. The inscriptions under that window show the history of their congregation and pastors.

Agnes died in 2005 leaving many fond memories with those who got to know her. Agnes served St. Paul's Church as Treasurer for many years. She also served on Grace Church's Council and as an advisor on the Mission Endowment Committee. Agnes also served on the Call Committee in 1995.

As a testament to the love and caring of her new church, she bequeathed \$41,500 to Grace Church. A small portion of that bequest was used for church maintenance and the balance was invested in the Agnes Dovle Fund. That investment generates income for the General Fund of Grace Church. As of December 2014, her investment has a value of \$37,500 and generates earnings of approximately \$1,500 yearly which is used for the general purposes of the church.

Grace Church is pleased and very thankful that Agnes Doyle, like many others before her, provided for its future through her bequest.


